Saturday November 10th on Knightlow Hill at 6.30 a.m: Wroth Silver ceremony.

Breakfast afterwards at the Queen's Head, Bretford.

This is said to be Britain's longest running annual ceremony being recorded as 'ongoing' in 1086 and on this site since 1170.

The ceremony takes place at the stone, the base of an old wayside cross, on the mound at the top of Knightlow Hill every 'Martinmas Eve before sun-rising'. That means on I I November every year just at first light the Wroth Money is collected from the parishes of the Hundred of Knightlow (this includes Ryton and Bubbenhall) by the Agent to the Duke of Buccleuch. In practice that is about 6.45am but it varies with the first light of dawn. Anyone is welcome to attend. Many people will be regular attenders and will be bringing their children.

The actual collection from the 25 parishes only lasts about four and a half minutes so do not be late!

Many people will already have been to the local pub, The Queens Head in Bretford (CV23 0JY Tel. 024 76542671 www.thequeenshead-bretford.co.uk) for the traditional drink of rum and hot milk. The bar usually opens at 6.00 am

All will then return to The Queens Head for a breakfast and speeches. Please note that breakfast tickets need to be pre-booked directly with the Queens Head, (breakfast cost was £13 in 2014. Included in the price is a glass of rum and hot milk with which to toast the health of His Grace and a churchwarden pipe (tobacco supplied). People will be departing by about 8.45am. Thought for the Month: Changing places or: Kindness is contagious!

A mother tells this story about a flight to the USA.

My 9-year-old daughter and I were flying to spend a week with my husband in the USA. Mike had been in Florida for five months



working for an Internet start-up company. We were excited about the trip because we had seen him only once in five months, and Katie missed her dad terribly.

I had noticed a troop of Boy Scouts at the gate and commented to my daughter that if anything happened, we would be OK with all those Scouts on our flight! Little did I know....

The plane was totally full, and because we did not get our boarding passes until we arrived at the gate, Katie and I could not get seats together and were separated by the aisle. That wasn't such a problem, except that Katie was nervous about the flight and had counted on my reading to her the whole way. Trying to read across the aisle would be a challenge, so when the two passengers who shared my row boarded the plane, I asked if they would swap places with Katie and me, so that we could be together.

They refused, saying they thought they should stay in their assigned seats.

Meanwhile, a mother and her three children were in a panic several rows ahead of us. There had been a mistake in their boarding passes, the whole family had been split up. The passengers in her row also refused to move elsewhere.

The mother could hold her baby, but her 6-year-old son and his older brother had been scattered around the plane. She was very concerned about the younger boy sitting with strangers. She was in tears, yet nobody offered to help her.

Suddenly the Scout leader stood up and said, "Madam, I think we can help you." He then spent five minutes rearranging his group so that adequate space was available for the family. The boys followed his directions cheerfully and without complaint, and the mother's relief was obvious.

Katie, however, was beginning to panic at the thought of not being next to her mother. I told her that there wasn't anything I could do; we would have to sit where we were. Amazingly, the man sitting with his wife in front of us, turned around to me and asked,




"Would you and your daughter like our seats?" We exchanged seats and continued our trip, very much relieved to be together.

Would that man have offered us his seat if the Scouts hadn't done so for the mum and her children?

Prayer: Lord, help me to be kind, and like the Scouts, to do a good deed every day.


St. Leonard's Christmas cards!


