


Lent is a penitential time, when we can reflect on our shortcomings and make ourselves ready for Easter. There will be a series of meetings in Lent - a Lent Course. We look at some texts and this year the theme is: 'The Psalms - prayers for today's church', with audio contributions by a number of well-known clergy and broadcasters.

The sessions are well put together and are very good and provoking lively discussion. This year, the Lent Course will take place on Monday evenings in Ryton Church centre, starting with a cup of tea or coffee at 7.30 p.m. The sessions will finish by 9.00 p.m. The first meeting will be at Ryton Church centre at 7.30pm on Monday February 15th. There will be five sessions in all, but do feel free to come to any of them.

Our thanks are also due to Ruth Smith, who kindly volunteered to play the organ and to help the choir members to rehearse.


The singers led the congregation in singing the Mass setting by Gregory Murray (the setting we have every Sunday) as well as hymns and responses etc.

Gift of Children's Bibles from Ryton Church to Provost Williams Church of England School.

Barbara Marsh, Foundation Governor, writes: The suggestion that the PCC give Bibles to the school came from the teachers at Provost Williams who felt that it would be really good if each class could have a Bible which was appropriate for the age of the children. It was agreed at PCC to give the staff a selection of Bibles so each teacher could choose the one they felt was best for their class.

So, on Thursday 22nd October (the closest one to Bible Sunday), a special assembly was held, led by the Revd. David Wintle when the Bibles were presented to the children.

David had carefully inscribed each one with the date and a Bible reference which would lead the children to a verse which would be particularly relevant to the stage they had reached on their journey through school: for example, ...,.

Children in church.



Although we do not at present have the resources to run regular services for children at Bubbenhall, we love having children in our churches, and there is always provision for them at the 9.30 a.m. services at Ryton.

All families with babies and children are sure of a warm welcome whenever they can join us. All Ryton Sunday morning services start at 9.30 a.m., and the pattern is:

2nd Sunday in every month: Village Worship.

The most informal of all our services.

We start in the Church Centre (warm and welcoming) with workshop activities for children, and coffee, puzzles and chat for grown-ups to get to know one another. At about 10.00 we move into church for a short and child-centred service. There is no need to be there on the dot of 9.30- people drift in as soon as they can make it.

4th Sunday in every month: Family Service.

An all-age service of readings, songs and activities with everybody young and old in church together.

Children always participate in the readings/ drama sketches etc. and several people bring instruments to accompany the songs. (and any other musicians among you and your children would be very welcome to join them)



Tea/coffee and cake after the service in the Church Centre.

Ist and 3rd Sundays in every month: Parish Communion with Sunday School.

Tea/coffee and the chance to socialise after every service. Children start the service in church with their parents, and after the first hymn go out for Sunday School activities in the Church Centre, returning to receive a blessing at the time of Communion. Parents are welcome to accompany their little ones to Sunday School and stay with them if they lack confidence at first.

Families from Bubbenhall are especially welcome at all these services.

Second and Fourth Sunday in every month at 9.30 a.m..



Thought for the Month: Ash Wednesday and Lent.



On Ash Wednesday, (which this year falls on February 10th) many of us come to church and kneel at the altar rail to receive a smudge of ashes on our foreheads. A smudge in the shape of a cross.

The first time that most of us had the sign of the cross made on our foreheads was when our parents brought us to the font and we were baptised.

That first time, the cross was made in pure, clean water- a symbol of pure, clean little souls, washed in the cleansing water of the sacrament of baptism.

The Ash Wednesday cross is made in dirty black ash, a symbol of- well, several things, among them our no-longer-clean souls, sullied and dirtied by our sins.

Pure water at baptism, dirty ashes today.

But- and it's a very important but- the sign and the gesture is the same.

A cross on the forehead.

A reminder today that, whatever we have done to dirty and spoil that baptismal innocence, we are still, despite everything, what it says in the catechism:

Members of Christ,

Children of God,

and inheritors of the Kingdom of Heaven.

Ash Wednesday, with its earthy, primitive, ritual smearing of our bare, vulnerable foreheads with dirt, Ash Wednesday brings us up short and makes us think of what we really are.

Ashes to ashes, dust to dust.

Words we hear more and more often as we grow older, our friends and loved ones die, and we attend their funerals.

Dust thou art, and to dust thou shalt return, said God to sinful Adam as he sorrowfully turned him out of the Garden of Eden.

Remember that you are dust, and to dust you shall return, each of us hears on Ash Wednesday as we receive the smudge of ash on our foreheads.

The question is, what are we going to do with the days that are allotted to us between this Ash Wednesday, and the day when the words: "Ashes to ashes, dust to dust" will be spoken over our coffins?

The obvious answer, especially at the beginning of Lent is: Repent.

Repent is a beautiful word, for a beautiful thing.

Repent doesn't mean grovel.

Repent doesn't mean be "ever so 'umble" like Dickens' Uriah Heep.

Repent means: "Turn back!"
Turn back to the person you really are.
Turn back to God.

There is great joy in Heaven, said Jesus, when one sinner repents, just as there was great joy in the heart of the Prodigal Son's father when his lost son got up from the bad place he was in and returned home. Repent means: turn back to God and be his son, his daughter once more.



Let's pray that during the weeks of Lent, we may experience the joy- joy on both sides- as we return to the Lord with all our hearts.

As we wash away the dirt of our sins in the water of repentance, and become again what we really are;

Members of Christ,
Children of God,
and inheritors of the Kingdom of Heaven.
