


Friday, August 15: The Assumption into Heaven of the Blessed Virgin Mary.

Children at St. Leonard's Church



We love having children in our church, and there is always provision for them at our 9.30 a.m. services. All families with babies and children are sure of a warm welcome whenever they can join us. All our Sunday morning services start at 9.30 a.m., and the pattern is:

2nd Sunday in every month: Village Worship.

The most informal of all our services. We start in the Church Centre (warm and welcoming) with workshop activities for children, and coffee, puzzles and chat for grown ups to get to know one another. At about 10.00 we move into church for a short and child-centred service. There is no need to be there on the dot of 9.30- people drift in as soon as they can make it

"A Sower went forth.." Arrangement made at Village Worship on July 13, and placed in church for all to enjoy.

4th Sunday in every month: Family Service.

An all-age service of readings, songs and activities with everybody young and old in church together. Children always participate in the readings/ drama sketches etc. and several people bring instruments to accompany the songs... (and any other musicians among you and your children would be very welcome to join them)

Tea/coffee and cake after the service in the Church Centre.

Ist and 3rd Sundays in every month: Parish Communion with Sunday School.

Tea/coffee and the chance to socialise after every service. Children start the service in church with their parents, and after the first hymn go out for Sunday School activities in the Church Centre, returning to receive a blessing at the time of Communion. Parents are welcome to accompany their little ones to Sunday School and stay with them if they lack confidence at first.

We value children at St Leonard's, and make them and their parents welcome.

Thought for the Month: A story. The Radio.

It was a cold evening in the Scottish Highlands; it looked as if it could snow. The mountain roads were treacherous with sheets of ice, so it was strange to see a car speeding recklessly through the night. The driver was a woman, probably in her late thirties, looking at the road as if in a trance. She wasn't aware of the tyres squealing on the bends. It didn't matter to her if she ran off the road and crashed into the valley below, because she was going to kill herself.

We don't know why her life had no meaning to her any more. It could have been a bad marriage or an abortion. It could have been whisky or drugs. The main thing was she had nowhere to turn, no one to trust, no one- including herself- that thought her life had any value. She had come up this road before. But tonight she was determined she would make it to the top and then speed off the road and into the gorge below.


She switched on the radio to calm down until she reached the top. A quiet voice came on and she listened; it was a minister. She had never been very religious even as a child; her family was always too busy for church. This man was talking about Jesus. How much he loved us, how he died for us. She wished she had something to die for. Something besides putting an end to her problems.

The minister was inviting people to the service now, he was giving the address of the church. It was a country church on the same mountain road she was on. A village up ahead. She had been through it before. It was almost at the top of the mountain. She might stop and find out more about this man Jesus and what he died for. She would like to have a purpose to her death, something besides escaping her miserable life.

As she went into the Church the same man with the quiet voice was speaking. Her mind was still not functioning well, but she was picking up some of the words. "This is love: not that we loved God, but that He loved us and sent His Son" ... "I will not forsake you, I will never leave you" ... The time passed and tears were running down her face. The man seemed to be looking straight at her. She knew he was talking to her. At the end of the

service she quietly knelt down and dedicated her life to lesus.

She felt new, clean. People were smiling at her and hugging her. Two people said how glad they were to see her, another asked if she would come back and join them. The minister brought his wife to meet her. She smiled at the minister and thanked him. She said "My life was almost over when I heard your broadcast."
